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
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Bread of Life

Every three years in the lectionary readings we have 5 weeks of the Bread of Life theme from John. (See *chapter six of John*) For these weeks in August we dig into the sixth chapter of John and immerse ourselves in it. We hear the story of Jesus feeding the 5000. We listen to the teachings of Jesus and hear him proclaim, *I am the bread of life*. We remember how God feeds and sustains us as followers of Jesus today in the church and in our personal lives.

Perhaps this message feels a little different to us this year in light of what we have been through. ***In what ways are you needing sustenance right now?*** Perhaps you are experiencing burnout and need refreshment. Perhaps you are craving community and need companionship to strengthen your soul. Perhaps your body or mind is in need of healing. Whatever situation you are in, you can come to Jesus, the Bread of Life.

You can find bread for your journey in the gathered community.

Whether you will be worshipping online, indoors, or out at Phoenix Park, each week Jesus will proclaim, *I am the bread of life*. Each week we will be fed by God’s word and by Jesus’ presence in communion. This weekly proclamation is a great reminder of our true source of sustenance. Jesus feeds us and sustains us always. God gives us spiritual bread for this journey, whatever it might be.

This month, let this wisdom of Jesus be your mantra. *I am the bread of life*. Let it soak into your hearts and minds and spirits. Trust in the living bread who gives eternal life.

Future Ministry Directions

Youth Council Members: With the graduations of Natalie and Calvin, council will be looking for anyone who may be interested in stepping into this position.

Caring Ministry - A document is in the shared drive for viewing in which the responsibilities are outlined for the caring ministry position. Discussion: The sharing of communion with homebound members is a big part of this ministry.

Motion: A motion for the caring ministry to continue as it has been established, advertise the posting to reach interested applicants, and that it be funded similarly as in the past is made by Emile, seconded by Bob and passed unanimously.

Ministry Support

Pastor's Report:

Pastor's report can be found in the shared drive. In addition, there is a proposal to consider closing the office on Fridays in August to help alleviate the responsibilities of office staff and accommodate for the additional time spent on Sunday worship. Discussion: A number of churches do this for the summer. This will not affect any current programs, such as the food pantry. Any change will be communicated via the e-blast.

Motion: I move to close the church office on Fridays for the month of August. This motion is made by Bill, seconded by Becky Carter, and is carried unanimously. This topic will be revisited next April in planning for the following summer schedule.

Pastor Jamie notified the Council that she will be on medical leave the month of August. Pulpit supply and on-call pastoral support has been arranged.

Property Report:

The Eagle Scout project is moving along well. Prioritizing was made for the picnic tables in the back and a Leopold-type bench near the front part of the church. Chips on the trail will be next and clearing of the pre-school trail and chips added will follow. A third priority will be cleaning, leveling, and additional work to the current fire pit area. If this part is not fulfilled at this time, it can be completed and continued at any given time.

The refrigerator went out last week and it overheated the outlet. An electrician replaced the outlet. On Thursday a technician will look at it.. Consideration will be given to replace the appliance vs repair it. Discussion: This unit was possibly purchased around 2005 (used) with a replacement compressor since then. Loud noise has been an ongoing concern. We may need to consider repair or replacement depending on usage. Once we know the price, we may need to make a decision. The food pantry fund, kitchen fund and

memorial fund may be able to support some funding for the replacement of the refrigerator. An email update may be sent out as more information is available. The possibility of an energy efficient replacement may be beneficial.

Tree removal: The ash trees in the boulevard are dying. The city is responsible for removal, but there are two ash trees closer to the church building and in need of removal on our part. There is a \$500 deductible for insurance to remove trees. Quotes have been acquired from two tree companies; ranging in cost from \$600 to \$1400 to take down, approximately \$340 in addition for stump grinding. The trees could provide wood chips for the walking paths. More information to be gathered before making a decision.

Discussion: How urgent is this project? There is not an immediate need. It could wait another year as the building is not in danger or anything. They may just look a little rough. Cutting the trees to coordinate with Eagle project by providing chips may be beneficial but chips may also be obtained by the Jeffer's Rd location. When cut and split the trees could provide wood for the fire ring. **Question:** Could the chips spread the disease or could burning spread disease? Not to our knowledge; the loading and transporting to other woods would be more detrimental than keeping the chips or wood here locally.

Lawn: Things are going fine and the limited rain has been helping.

Parking lot: In 2017 the parking lot was resealed for approximately \$4800. It is suggested that 3 -5 years is a good time to reseat the lot. One concern is the faded painted lines for parking spots vs the seal itself. Resealing would include filling cracks, resealing the lot, and repainting the lines. The process includes gummy caulk in the cracks and thick oil over it all. It then needs time to cure. Temperature can be critical in this process, so waiting too long may require us to wait until next year. Bids have been collected. **Discussion:** How do we pay for this? Do we ask for a special congregation vote or wait until next year's annual meeting as a budget item this year? Discussion was given around repainting the lines for driver and parking safety. Perhaps resealing can wait for a year/year and a half and possibly it would be better as a budget time. Another alternative would be to paint this year and then reseat/repaint in the future as an alternative to resealing this year. Some companies are already done this year in scheduling residential projects.

AC units: Hovland was at Immanuel this spring to discuss ventilation and check the ducts and furnace. They couldn't check the AC then. The AC checks for all units would cost \$700-1000 to check for potential problems. Things can be done to make the unit more efficient.

Discussion: Should we do it now with a few weeks left this season or wait until next year and get on a service company's schedule for the new season/year? **Suggestion:** Get it checked now and get recommendations for next year to figure into the next budget. This would be better to not be surprised by an unexpected problem. Bill will get the AC checked and use the current maintenance budget (\$1,330) to cover the service call.

Roof drains: It is important to continue to keep an eye on this.

A motion to approve the property report was made by Bob, seconded by Olympia Evergreen, and unanimously approved.

Finance Report:

The financial reports can be found in the shared drive. A motion to approve the financial reports was made by Becky Carter, seconded by Emilie, and passed unanimously.

Caring Ministry Coordinator

After six years of dedicated, "caring" service, Janet Carlson has stepped down as Immanuel's Caring Ministry Coordinator. We thank Janet for her leadership and guidance in ensuring that Immanuel lives out its calling to be a caring congregation.

We are now accepting applications for a new Caring Ministry Coordinator. The primary focus will be on Eucharistic Ministry, a ministry that provides communion and fellowship to homebound members. The Coordinator is responsible for training the lay leaders who bring communion to these homebound members. Other responsibilities may include helping with healing services and coordinating circles of care (formed in response to specific short-term needs of Immanuel members).

This position is paid a stipend, and hours are flexible but are expected to be 20-25 per month. Included in these hours are worship attendance, meeting and training time with eucharistic ministers, and informal meetings with Pastor Jamie.


Biblical Justice Forum
