God and Gender

"Is God a girl or a boy?" a little child asked during Sunday school class. This question often comes up in our journey of faith as we grow in our relationship with God. What gender is God? Oftentimes, I respond with a general answer. "God is neither a boy or a girl. God is spirit!" That answer leaves a lot to desire when it comes to our deep longing to know and understand God. To gain a deeper understanding of God's being, we must dig a little deeper. We can gain many insights into the character of God, including God's gender identity, through the scriptures, prayer, and the witness of the saints around us.

In our first creation story from Genesis, we hear God say, "Let us make humankind in our image. So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them, male and female he created them." This wisdom from our creation story implies that both male and female are included in God's image. God's wonderfully big nature includes both masculine and feminine. We know that we are all created in God's image and we are beloved children. All genders are a part of God's good creation.

In the prophetic works of the Hebrew Bible we see images of God portrayed as a mother. In the words of Isaiah, God says, "As a mother comforts her child, so I will comfort you." Here we see God's love not only as a father but also through the lens of a nurturing mother.

There are many metaphors and images for God throughout the Bible. Sometimes God is referred to as rock, light, fire, a still small voice, a father, a mother, a savior, a prince, a shepherd, or a gate. All of these metaphors have a yes and a no within them. They all attempt to describe God, and yet at the same time fall short of truly describing our indescribable creator, redeemer, and sustainer. In our prayer lives we can connect to God through many different images. These images help us to draw closer to God through the truths expressed through these metaphors. We can know the loving comfort of God our mother. We can feel the warmth and grace of God our light. We can hear the still, small voice within us speaking God's truth. All of these experiences make up God, and they are all accessible to us through prayer and meditation and study of the scriptures.

Many saints of the past and present have helped us to see the reality that God is expressed through varied gender identities. St. Julian of Norwich shared these beautiful thoughts of God that she obtained through a spiritual vision:

"It is a characteristic of God to overcome evil with good. Jesus Christ therefore, who himself overcame evil with good, is our true Mother. We received our 'Being' from Him - and this is where His Maternity starts - And with it comes the gentle Protection and Guard of Love which will never cease to surround us. Just as God is our Father, so God is also our Mother."

Saints of today show us that God loves all people, including people of every gender identity and sexual orientation. Part of our journey as a Reconciling in Christ congregation is to continue to learn and grow in our awareness of God's beloved children and their unique experiences.

Writer and Pastor Emmy Kegler explains it like this, "But God, in big and little ways, has picked up a woman's broom and swept every corner of creation. God, in big and little ways, has tucked up her skirts and flattened herself on the floor, dug through dust bunnies and checked every dress pocket. God has found us, dustier and rustier and without any luster, and held us up to the light to say: No matter how you rolled away or what corner you were dropped in, you are mine." Her ministry along with ministry of Reconciling Works and other LGBTQIA+ Christians shows us that we are all made in God's image, because God's gender is

diverse and expansive. God wants all people to feel included in her family, the church. Learning more about gender identities and expressions can help us to live into this diverse and beautiful dream of God's family.

God's beloved: You have all been set free from gender stereotypes and norms to live into your freest and truest selves. God has set you free, therefore go and set others free!



Extending Hospitality to People of All Gender Identities and Gender Expressions in the Congregation

Beyond the Binary: Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity, and Gender Expression from Reconciling Works

Since most everyone has been steeped in the gender binary system, some of these concepts can seem very foreign. This can be a lot of information to take in. So, let's pause and remember why it is important to learn these new understandings. In the RIC Welcoming Journey, the goal is to deepen and expand a faith community's ability to welcome people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions. However, to this day the dominant story LGBTQIA+ people hear from communities of faith is God does not love them just as they are. The hope for a faith community is to be able to respond with hospitality and true welcome to people who hold a diversity of identities, particularly differences in gender identity and/or gender expression. It is important to remember, people learn new things about themselves and their bodies as they go through life; do not freeze people in time.

Here are some helpful definitions:

<u>Sex:</u> Is assigned at birth based on external genitalia, reproductive organs, chromosomes, and hormones. Some people with ambiguous or other biological complexities (such as chromo- somal pattern or hormonal shift), may identify as intersex. Such as: Male, Intersex, Female

<u>Gender Identity:</u> Refers to a person's innate, deeply felt physiological identification as a woman, man, or another gender which may or may not correspond to the sex they were assigned at birth. Gender Identity is different from the term "gender," which is typically used in reference to social and cultural differences rather than biological ones. Such as: Woman, Genderqueer, Man

<u>Gender Expression:</u> Refers to the external characteristics and behaviors that are socially defined as either masculine or feminine, such as dress, grooming, mannerisms, speech patterns and social interactions. The norms vary culturally. Such as: Feminine, Androgynous, Masculine

<u>Sexual Orientation:</u> Is the term used to describe which gender(s) someone is physically and or emotionally attracted to. Lesbian, gay, bisexual, pansexual, queer, and straight are all examples of sexual orientations. A person's sexual orientation is distinct from a person's sex, gender identity, and gender expression. Attracted to Men, Bisexual, Pansexual, Queer, Attracted to Women

People over definitions and personal pronouns:

Personal pronouns are the set of pronouns a person wants others to use when talking to or about them. Ask a person what pronouns they prefer. Remember if someone is feminine presenting, it does not automatically mean they use she/her/hers pronouns. You cannot assume someone's pronouns based on the persons' gender expression.

The term "gender identity" is more inclusive than "sex" or "gender," because not everyone who was assigned a certain sex at birth identifies as that gender later in life. Including "gender non- conforming" and/ or a "custom" options extends additional hospitality.

It is important to ask for pronouns when making event name-tags, because one cannot assume a person's pronouns based on their name or gender expression.

Not all queer people use he/him/his or she/her/hers pronouns. For some "they, them, theirs," "xe, xem, xyrs," or "ze, hir, hirs" are gender inclusive pronouns which most accurately reflect that person's identity.

Additional ways to extend hospitality include:

•ADDING PERSONAL PRONOUNS TO NAME-TAGS:

Purchase premade name-tags with pronouns, provide markers for attendees to fill in the blank, or print your own mini pronoun stickers for attendees to select and wear.

•GENDER INCLUSIVE RESTROOMS:

Ensure your gathering spaces have clearly labeled gender inclusive restrooms available for attendees. This can also extend hospitality to families with small children or people with physical disabilities.

•INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE:

Work to make sure materials for your gatherings have updated language that is inclusive of gender non-conforming individuals. Try swapping out binary phrases like "women and men" and "brothers and sisters" with more inclusive phrases like "siblings in Christ" or "God's beloved."

Immanuel Lutheran has a team of caring people that are trained to provide communion to those who are not able to be at church on a regular basis or not at all. The team is called the Eucharistic Ministry Team. Each person is partnered with one or two people that will have a visit at least one time per month. During the visit and along with the gift of communion, a devotion or scripture reading can be shared, a review of the bulletin, the *Image* or just conversation of what is going on at Immanuel can happen. All Eucharistic Ministers are provided with training, a communion kit and the service for communion. The first visit can be solo or partnered with Janet or Pastor Jamie. The team also meets 3-4 times per year for follow-up, support and fellowship.

Being a Eucharistic Minister is meaningful for those who are receiving communion as well as for those who are sharing in this special meal of communion.

Why should we care for others?

Simple question right? But maybe not. In the book "Christian Caregiving, a Way of Life" by Kenneth C. Haugk, founder of Stephen Ministries, Dr. Haugk was asked by a patient why he was a psychologist. The patient not being satisfied with the answer of "I very much enjoy working with people" wanted a deeper answer. Dr. Haugk finally responded after contemplation that his real reason "lies in my faith in God and in what God has done for me in Jesus Christ. I believe that Jesus cares for me so much that he was willing to give his life for

me. Remembering his love, I can't help but reach out and share

that love and care with others."

In my own life experiences I can attest that being cared for has been one of the biggest blessings and one of the biggest "aha" moments of growth of my faith. Being a very independent person one of the greatest gifts I have ever received was the ability to let go of that so called independence of taking care of things myself and letting others care and do for me. This happened when my son Tom was diagnosed with cancer. I was not able to keep up with daily living tasks such as grocery shopping, cleaning the house, yard care or even making meals due to Tom's weekly or even daily trips to Rochester, MN, for treatments, the incredible amount of time



that he spent in the hospital, and just being emotionally exhausted to do the next thing. Our Immanuel family and friends walked with my family during this time to provide care for us. I gave up my so called independence to do everything myself and accepted this beautiful gift of being cared for. Nothing was required of me as a way of paying back or owing anybody. We were simply loved and cared for.

Our friends and family gave their time, possibly giving up something else to do so. Jesus gave up much more than just time - he gave his life for us because he loved and cared for us so much. Caring for others can be a big project like building a house for Habitat for Humanities or sitting on boards that do philanthropic work. But it can be as simple as greeting strangers as we pass by them or looking up at the cashier at Target instead of looking at our phones.

This past September I, along with Deb Kavanagh, Emilie Anderson and Karen Betzig-Lundberg, attended a mini training and informational session about Stephen Ministries, Inc. Stephen Ministries works with faith organizations to provide training and tools to equip people to care for others in their congregations. In the coming months we will be having discussions, researching and praying if Stephen Ministries would be a good fit for Immanuel as we continue to be a caring congregation.
