Immanuel Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes March 17, 2020

Meeting called to order at 1900

Devotion: Lang shared with us a connection from Rev. Eden. In a reference to the 1527 plague throughout Europe, Martin Luther wrote to emphasize the duty to care, use caution for neighbors, and the role of church and hospital. He encouraged the use of medicine and reason and through his writing, reminds us to trust the Lord.

Thank You Notes: A thank you to Dee for accompanying the choir as a need presented itself.

Prior Meeting Minutes: Moved to accept Feb. minutes with corrections by Bob, seconded by Keith, passed unanimously

New Business:

<u>Infectious Disease Precaution</u> - Using the current precautions given at the state and national level, Lang is recommending we vote to move services online moving forward. Lang and Bill propose moving forward with online worship services indefinitely. Clarification was made that those leading the service will be in attendance and those not involved will not attend, including the choir. The service will be a bit more limited under these circumstances with special music incorporated when possible. A link will be given for video from FB and audio is available. A YouTube link is something that may be considered in the future. Karen shared that the online experience from last Sunday was a comfort and she and her husband enjoyed the service. The motion was been made by Lang to move to online services until the next council meeting. Seconded by Bob and approved by council.

<u>Covid-19 Council Planning/letter</u> - Pastor Jamie shared a draft of a letter to the church body to outline changes that will be in place with the new developments. Virtual visits to members in need, such as those in a hospital setting, can still take place to provide support as needed. There are steps being put in place to help recruit volunteers to assist members who are in need of supports during this time. Discussion involved how to best get the word out that volunteers are needed or those in need may find a volunteer. The possibility of emailing or calling members was discussed. In discussion of the letter itself, the office hours will be limited to Thurs and Fri to correlate to the Food Pantry days with phone messages and email being responded to as staff will continue to work remotely. Providing a small gate or barrier to help limit proximity was discussed as well as the best possible ways to pre-pack food pantry items and allow for pick up with limited interface. The message will communicate clearly that Kim will be thoroughly cleaning the entire church. Dee will take the lead on the council suggestions for food pantry distribution. Discussion was made around the language and policy for funerals services to limit numbers and public involvement. Communication from tonight's meeting will be distributed in the monthly newsletter, Facebook, email, and on the church voicemail.

Electric Bill -

Lang and Dee worked together to analyze energy cost based on billing during the previous year. Focus On Energy found that 20 - 25% of the electric bill has been linked to a space heater in the back hallway. Lang has reduced the output from the heater for now. Bill and Kim will look into any concern of water pipes being affected if the space heater is off/lowered. LED lights are another recommendation for a savings of energy. Lang will look into a Thrivent grant to help assist in replacing the lights. One water heater from 1985 is not as efficient. There is a \$250 voucher for replacement if there is an interest in doing so down the road along with the possibility of a programmable or user sensitive thermostat. Peggy asked if the building heat can be reduced for the duration while the space is not being used as usual. The furnace is over 25 years old, so that is not as efficient and may need to be considered down the road. Buying renewable energy (1/3 of our use) is a possibility either by month or 5-year commitment as it would support environmental stewardship. Lang moved to make a 5-year commitment for \$1500 (\$26/month) for investment in renewable energy. Jennifer seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

It will be communicated to the church that the council is committing to positive energy usage by taking this course of action.

Peggy's term: Sandy LaValley was on the ballot for council and would like to serve. Peggy wishes to step down from finishing her current term. Peggy moved to approve Sandy to the council, Lang seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously. Lang will officially welcome Sandy and be in contact with her as she will serve at the next council meeting.

Bill recommends a virtual council meeting or email to review the situation as updates to Covid-19 continue to develop.

Next month —- cemetery John - request a written proposal

Old Business

Lang has obtained a \$10,000 grant from the trust fund to support the projection project.

Reports

Finance: Lang reviewed the finance report and will submit it to the shared drive. The finance reports will wait for the next council meeting to be approved. We will also discuss how to communicate to members regarding giving in these unusual circumstances. We will look for ways to monitor the giving as well as the increase/decrease of giving and expenses may fluctuate.

Property: Bill submitted the report to the google drive. The claim is not yet finalized, but more information is being gathered on the claim as well as the ceiling being looked at with an assessment to see if there is further damage.

*A motion was made to approve the Property report and Pastor's report by Lang, seconded by Bob, and approved unanimously.

Stewardship: Did not meet

Pastor's Report: Written report submitted to share drive.

Pastor Jamie ended with prayer

Adjourn: Natalie moves to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Calvin, and passed unanimously.

Next Meeting: Tues., April 21st

PPP Announcement

The council voted to apply for a grant from the Paycheck Protection Program through the federal government to cover the cost of payroll for two and a half months for the church and preschool staff. We were awarded a PPP grant that will go toward payroll and necessary expenses for April, May, and part of June. 




MINISTRY UPDATES

Zomba Immanuel Partnership

At the ZIP meeting on April 19th, 2020, our team discussed the fearful messages coming from our Malawi friends during the onset of COVID-19. Many are worried about a lack of income and access to food if the country is shutdown. According to several news sources¹ Malawi's 21-day lockdown, due to start April 18th, was blocked by the High Courts for seven days due to fears of starvation. According to our contacts in the ELCM, large group worship is shut down along with other small businesses in Malawi. We discussed using our savings to help the ELCM as the staff, Pastors, Evangelists and workers are currently without pay. Food stations are also in need of funds, so we will be sending the ELCM \$2000 quickly to help with these needs. We have pledged to use our remaining \$5000 as a "matching" gift to encourage other congregations in the ELCA's NW Synod to donate to the long term need of hunger that will be exacerbated by COVID-19. 
